1.- "A constitution is not the act of a government, but of a people constituting a government; and government without a constitution, is power without a right.

.... A constitution is the property of a nation, and not of those who exercise the government. All the constitutions of America are declared to be established on the authority of the people. In France, the word nation is used instead of the people; but in both cases, a constitution is a thing antecedent to the government, and always distinct therefrom." (Paine, Thomas (1791), *Rights of Man*, (Pelican Classics, 1969), pp. 207 and 213)

Thomas Paine took the view that the UK lacked a constitution. Do you agree? Discuss Paine's conception of a constitution and its fit to the UK constitution.

2.- "The rule of law enforced by the courts is the ultimate controlling factor on which our constitution is based." (*Jackson v Her Majesty's Attorney General* [2005] UKHL 56, [107] per Lord Hope). Discuss with reference to the doctrine of parliamentary sovereignty.

Scottish Parliament.

5.- "Whether a particular provision or provisions should be included in primary

or delegated legislation ... is pre-eminently a matter of political judgment"

(Secretary of State for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs v Downs

[2009] EWCA Civ 664, [103] per Sullivan LJ). Discuss with reference to the

distribution of law-making powers between government and Parliament and

the constitutional challenges of delegated legislation.
